INTRODUCTION

This manual has been prepared by the Pennsylvania Military Community Enhancement Commission to provide general information on the ten major military installations, organizations, and other military entities within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is designed to assist key individuals throughout all levels of government and the private sector within the Commonwealth in enhancing and promoting the 60,000 active, reserve, National Guard and Department of Defense positions within the Commonwealth.

The Commonwealth has undergone Base Realignment and Closure processes in 1988, 1991, 1993, 1995, and 2005. During these rounds, the commonwealth lost 4,607 military positions and 14,292 civilian positions. All were considered good paying, recession proof, career enhancing and family sustaining jobs. The financial impact of the loss of these positions does not include the indirect and induced positions within the local communities.

The mission of the Pennsylvania Military Community Enhancement Commission is to assist the Governor in the enhancement of the military value of and advocacy for all installations, organizations and defense related stakeholders in the commonwealth. The commission's intent is to both enhance and promote the military in Pennsylvania into the future and to be the best possible host for all military organizations, the military and civilian personnel and their families.

The commonwealth is in a very unique position. It is not the host garrison of an active Army Division, or the home port for a Navy Carrier Battle Group, or the home base for a multi-faceted Air Force Wing. Instead, all active military installations within the Commonwealth are maintenance depots, logistics centers and one educational institution. In addition, there are Reserve Centers and numerous National Guard facilities located throughout Pennsylvania.

There are 17 sections in this manual. Each section contains general information on each of the Active, Reserve and National Guard organizations within the Commonwealth, including sections for the Army Corps of Engineers, Military Entrance Processing Stations, Naval Operations Support Centers, Marine Corps Reserve Units, Army ROTC units, Navy ROTC units and Air Force ROTC units. All co-located units are listed within the entry for their host organization or installation. All information is current as of 1 October, 2015.

Colonel Jeffrey A. Van Dootingh is the Commander of the 911th Airlift Wing, Pittsburgh International Airport Air Reserve Station, Coraopolis, Pa. As Installation Commander, he is the senior officer responsible for the wing organization, which includes authorized manning of 1,263 Air Force Reserve members and approximately 500 civilian employees (including more than 184 dual-status Air Reserve Technicians).

Colonel Van Dootingh was commissioned in 1985 upon graduation of the United States Air Force Academy. A 1986 Distinguished Graduate of Undergraduate Navigator Training at Mather AFB, Calif., he served over six years of active duty as an Instructor Navigator and Flight Safety Officer before joining the Air Force Reserve in 1991. As a reserve citizen airman, he served as the Standardization/Evaluation Navigator while working as a chemist until 1995 when he became a dual status Air Reserve Technician. Since that time, he has held such diverse positions as Chief of Current Operations, flying squadron Director of Operations, numbered Air Force Director, Operations Group Commander, and Headquarters Division Chief.

A master navigator with over 7,400 hours, Colonel Van Dootingh has amassed more than 420 combat hours in Panama, Southwest Asia, and the Balkans, including the first C-130 mission into northern Iraq at the onset of OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM. As Deputy Group Commander of DoD's only fixed-wing aerial spray unit, he flew numerous missions to provide relief from insect borne diseases in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, eventually spraying a record three million acres and earning him the highest award given by the Centers for Disease Control.

Colonel Joseph M. Potts is commander of the 911th Airlift Wing Operations Group, Pittsburgh International Airport Air Reserve Station, Coraopolis, Pa. As Operations Group commander, he is the senior officer responsible for an eight ship C-130 unit equipped airlift squadron, an aeromedical evacuation squadron and a support flight. The Colonel ensures the group maintains the capability to rapidly deploy in response to worldwide contingencies and emergencies.

Colonel Potts was born in Johnstown, Pa. He received his commission in 1979 through the ROTC program at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, N.Y., where he earned a bachelor's degree in aeronautical engineering. After completing Undergraduate Navigator Training, Col. Potts was assigned to Royal Air Force Upper Heyford, U.K. as an F-111E Weapon Systems Officer (WSO). Following graduation from Undergraduate Pilot Training in 1984, Col. Potts was assigned as a C-130H pilot at Dyess Air Force Base, Texas. Colonel Potts completed a special operations assignment before joining the Air Force Reserve in 1992.

As a C-130 pilot at Willow Grove Air Reserve Station, Pa., he became an Air Reserve Technician in 1998 and served as an evaluator pilot, Chief of Tactics, and Chief of Safety. He led the 913th Airlift Wing's initial qualification programs for Night Vision Goggle airdrop and airland operations, ensuring combat readiness for the wing's 2003 Operation ENDURING/IRAQI FREEDOM deployment. Prior to his current assignment, Colonel Potts was Director of Operations, 328th Airlift Squadron, Niagara Falls Air Reserve Station, N.Y. Colonel Potts is a command pilot with over 7,400 flying hours in a variety of aircraft.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Baltimore District, has 1087 civilian employees and 40 military members. In FY15, its expenditures were about \$1.5 billion.

The district has a robust, multi-state and multi-installation military construction program. The Baltimore District area of responsibility in Pennsylvania is the center of the state around the Susquehanna River. There are two other Corps districts – Philadelphia and Pittsburgh – that handle military construction in the eastern and western thirds of the state, respectively.

The Baltimore District has many ongoing projects in Pennsylvania, some are large (like the new Defense Logistics Agency headquarters building at the Defense Distribution Depot-Susquehanna in New Cumberland) while others are small (like the heating and cooling system replacement at Fort Indiantown Gap). In 2015 and beyond, we continue to build projects that support Soldiers and our interagency partners.

The district supports our service members through a military design, engineering and construction management program. Facility projects include design and construction of administrative spaces, medical and laboratory facilities, training facilities, childcare centers, barracks, and other facilities.

Overall, the district provides contract administration and construction management by delivering architect, engineer and construction capabilities tied to project and program management services through the life cycle of each facility. We provide our military stakeholders with quality facilities that meet mission needs and are in compliance with laws, regulations and budgets. In addition, many of our projects are often technically complex and both high-value and highly visible.

Colonel Edward P. MISSION STATEMENT:

The Pittsburgh District provides expertise to help the region and the nation meet water resources development, environmental and other engineering needs.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' involvement in works "of a civil nature" dates back almost to the origins of the United States. Over the years, as the Nation's needs have changed, so have the Army's Civil Works missions. Those missions today fall into four broad areas.

- Water infrastructure
- Environmental management and restoration
- Response to natural and man-made disasters
- Engineering and technical services

Missions in each of these areas support the Army, Department of Defense and other federal, state and local agencies.

Civil Works projects are located throughout the United States to address a wide variety of national needs. The primary funds for the Corps of Engineers' Civil Works program come from the annual Energy and Water Resources Development Appropriation (WRDA), not the Defense budget. A typical annual Civil Works program budget is about \$5 billion and includes WRDA funds and cost-sharing funds supplied directly by non-federal sponsors for specific projects plus reimbursable work performed for other federal agencies.

The process for developing Civil Works projects begins when citizens see a need for flood protection, navigation or other water-related infrastructure and ask Congress for help. Congress directs the Corps of Engineers to do an engineering or feasibility study to determine the project's validity. Corps studies typically include two phases: an initial reconnaissance to determine if a feasible solution is likely, then a feasibility study to examine alternatives and select the alternative that best meets national and local needs.

Most feasibility studies require local sponsor cost-sharing. If the study determines that a project is warranted, Congress may authorize the project and appropriate funds. Most projects are built with a combination of federal funds and contributions by non-federal sponsors. Generally, the local non-federal sponsor operates and maintains the completed project.

In June 1993, he reported to his first submarine, the USS HYMAN G RICKOVER (SSN 709) in Norfolk, VA. During his tour, RICKOVER completed a six month deployment to the Mediterranean with the GEORGE WASHINGTON Battle Group and a three month independent deployment to the Northern Atlantic.

Naval Criminal Investigative Service (NCIS) Investigates crimes committed on Navy property and provides counter-intelligence services.

Naval Inactive Ship Maintenance Facility (NISMO) Inactivates, stores, removes parts and components from inactive ships for reutilization and prepares for disposal Navy non-nuclear ships assigned.

Naval Medical Clinic (NAVMEDCLIN) Provides basic medical aid to installation commands and provides occupational health and OSHA-mandated screening services to those activities.

Naval Foundry and Propeller Center, Detachment Philadelphia (NFPC) The largest public-owned foundry and propeller shop, provides a single facility within the naval establishment for marketing, designing, engineering, manufacturing and repairing propellers for all types of surface and sub-surface craft of the U.S. Navy and its customers.

NAVFAC Mid-Atlantic PA/NJ IPT Provides transportation services and maintenance and repair of buildings, roads and utilities for Navy installations in Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

Facilities Engineering Acquisitions Department (FEAD) Supervises and inspects construction contracts in Pennsylvania and Delaware.

MAJOR CHANGES TO INSTALLATION OR COMMAND RESULTING FROM PREVIOUS BRAC ACTIVITIES:

Pre-BRAC-91: The base (League Island Naval Complex) included the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, Naval Station Philadelphia and 30+ tenant activities. At that time there were approximately 20,000+ military and civilian personnel at the complex (not including military aboard ships in for repair).

BRAC-91: Closed the Naval Station and the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, leaving the Naval Surface Warfare Center, Carderock Division, Ship Systems Engineering Station (NAVSSSES); the Foundry and Propeller Center (NFPC); the Naval Inactive Ships Maintenance Facility Detachment (NISMF); and several small support detachments (FISC, PWC, etc.) as active commands. The property of PNSY inside the Controlled Industrial Area (CIA) was to be preserved while the remainder of the complex not occupied by NSWCCD-SSES, NFPC, NISMF, or the small support detachments was to be excessed and turned over to the City of Philadelphia through the Philadelphia Industrial Authority for Development (PAID).

BRAC-95: Eliminated the majority of the CIA and closed NSWCCD Annapolis, transferring approximately 280 positions and \$100M in facilities of Machinery Research and Development from Annapolis to NSWCCD Philadelphia.

Post BRAC-95: Following the shutdown to the Naval Station Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, NAVSSSES became the host activity for the remaining Navy/Federal activities at the "Naval Base". Closure ceremonies for NAVSTA Philadelphia were held in September 1995, and the closure ceremony for PNSY was held at the end of September 1996. During the interim, between the shutdown in early 1995 and the actual closure, approximately 200 PNSY employees closed up buildings and environmentally cleaned up property to be excessed/turned over to the City of Philadelphia.

On 30 March 2000, the Philadelphia Authority for Industrial Development (PAID) signed the deed on behalf of the City of Philadelphia for all non-Navy-retained property at the League Island Complex – now the Philadelphia Naval Business Center, which was placed under the control of the Philadelphia Industrial Development Corporation (PIDC) for development as a privately owned industrial park. Portions of that property were, in turn, sold to private civilian industries, i.e. Aker Philadelphia Shipyard.

Post 1 October 2003: Commander Naval Installation (CNI), Mid-Atlantic Region assumed control and maintenance responsibility for all Navy-retained property, buildings, and roads. This removed the Host Activity responsibilities from NAVSSSES.

MAJOR CHANGES TO INSTALLATION OR COMMAND RESULTING FROM PREVIOUS BRAC ACTIVITIES:

BRAC-95: Tobyhanna gained new missions and workload in each of five BRAC rounds. In BRAC 1995, McClellan AFB in California closed and the ground communications-electronics maintenance mission performed there at the Sacramento Air Logistics Center was transferred to Tobyhanna. The three-year transition of capability on 161 systems was completed in September 2000. BRAC 95 also directed the realignment of Letterkenny Army Depot and the transfer of its guidance and control system repair workload (for three tactical missile systems) to Tobyhanna. This workload transfer was completed in July 2001.

As a result of BRAC 1995 workload transitions, Tobyhanna Army Depot converted 125,000 sq. ft. of warehouse space into high-tech production facilities and added more than 7,000 sq. ft. of new facilities.

BRAC-05: The depot gained electro-optics, generator, fire control, radar and radio workload from the Naval Weapons Station Seal Beach and the Marine Corps Logistics Base Barstow, both in California, as a result of BRAC 2005 recommendations. These workload transfers directly resulted in only a minimal employment gain for Tobyhanna, but served to enhance the depot's interservice relationship with the Navy and Marine Corps and opened up the potential for additional workload in the future.

Tobyhanna also lost some positions as a result of the BRAC 2005. In total, approximately 40 employees of the depot's Automated Storage and Retrieval System (ASRS) function, receiving function, and hazardous material storage function transferred to Defense Distribution Depot – Tobyhanna in FY07 as a result of the BRAC 2005 decision to consolidate these functions in place under the Defense Logistics Agency.

Colonel Gregory Peterson is the 31st commander of Tobyhanna Army Depot, the Defense Department's largest facility for the repair, overhaul and integration of Command, Control, Communications, Computer, Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance (C4ISR) systems. The depot, located in Northeastern Pennsylvania, employs about 3,100 personnel.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Ordnance Corps after completion of the Reserve Officer Training Corps and earned a Bachelor of Science in Political Science from the University of Northern Iowa.

During his career, Colonel Peterson has held leadership positions in the United States and overseas. In 2004, the colonel worked as an operational planner for U.S. Army Pacific at Fort Shafter, Hawaii. He later served in several positions while stationed at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, support operations officer and executive officer for the 17th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion and he deployed for Operation Iraqi Freedom as the operations officer with the 45th Sustainment Brigade. Peterson was an observer/trainer at the Battle Command Training Program, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. From 2009 to 2011 he commanded the General Support Aviation Battalion, Fort Irwin, California. 

Pennsylvania's Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA) has a dual mission: to oversee and support the members of the Pennsylvania National Guard (PNG) and to provide quality service to the Commonwealth's veterans and their families, and. We fulfill our dual mission by:

- Preparing the PNG for combat, performing worldwide combat and combat support operations, providing global reach and the projection of U.S. military power in support of national objectives; and, at the command of the governor, providing trained personnel to support state and local authorities in times of natural disaster or civil strife.
- Providing resources and assistance to Pennsylvania's nearly one million veterans and their families, and providing quality care for aging and disabled veterans.


The Pennsylvania National Guard is comprised of the Pennsylvania Army National Guard and the Pennsylvania Air National Guard.

Created by the Act of April 11, 1793, the Adjutant General Department was later renamed the Department of Military Affairs by the Administrative Code of 1923. The Act of March 21, 1996 changed the name to what it is today – the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs.

DMVA is one of Pennsylvania's largest employers, with more than 21,000 military and civilian personnel in some 90 communities statewide.

The DMVA and PNG are headquartered at Fort Indiantown Gap in Lebanon County. Fort Indiantown Gap features more than 17,000 acres and 140 training areas and facilities for year-round training. The Fort Indiantown Gap Training Center is among the busiest National Guard Training Centers in the country, hosting the second busiest heliport in the United States. Training is available for all U.S. military components and foreign military forces, law enforcement agents, and civilians from across the nation.

MAJOR CHANGES TO INSTALLATION OR COMMAND RESULTING FROM PREVIOUS BRAC ACTIVITIES:

The 2005 BRAC round resulted in closure of Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base Willow Grove (Horsham Twp, PA) and establishment of a military enclave for use by the 111th FW, PaANG, 270th EIS, PaANG, HQ 56th Brigade, (PAARNG), and an Armed Forces Reserve Center for use by several Army Reserve units. The military footprint at Willow Grove was reduced from about 1,000 acres to less than 200 acres. The 913th Airlift Wing (AFRES) was deactivated outside BRAC and its 8 C-130 aircraft moved. The Air Force recommendation to deactivate the 111th Fighter Wing (PaANG) was disapproved, but the A-10s assigned to the unit were redistributed, and the flying mission came to an end. The runway and associated facilities at Willow Grove are closed. Approximately 1,200 Navy and Marine military and civilian jobs were lost.

At Pittsburgh, an Air Force recommendation to close the Air Reserve Station and deactivate the 911th Airlift Wing was disapproved by the BRAC Commission. Eight C-130 aircraft remained at the Pittsburgh ARS.

Primary and tenant organizations mission statements at Fort Indiantown Gap:

Joint Force Headquarters: Provides command and control for the Pennsylvania Army and Air National Guard.

Fort Indiantown Gap Training Center: Provides military training for active and Reserve components of all military services. Accommodations for Civilian organizations are made when resources are available. The Training Center provides more than 860,000 training mandays on

the installation annually comprised of (active, Reserve & National Guard), multi-service personnel, civilians, and foreign nationals.

Eastern Aviation Training Site: Conducts aviator and aircrew training in attack, cargo and utility helicopters to include: UH-60 Blackhawk, UH-1H Huey, CH-47D Chinook, AH-64 Apache and the UH-72 Lakota for U.S. and foreign military personnel. The Lakota is the newest helicopter in the Army and the EAATS was designated as *the* training facility for this system. In addition to the aircraft training, EAATS personnel operate flight simulators in all systems listed above.

Headquarters, 166th Regiment (Combat Arms): Provides regionalized combat arms individual training, including Military Occupational Specialty Qualification, Additional Skill Identifier, Non-Commissioned Officer Education System and Officer Education System (Officer Candidate School) training for the Army National Guard, the United States Army Reserve and the active Army. Provides management and quality assurance oversight for the functionally aligned Total Army School System (TASS) Battalions within the region and monitors and coordinates academic instruction, food and lodging (where available) for soldiers participating in courses at its training sites.

Northeast Counterdrug Training Center: Provides Drug Law Enforcement and Demand Reduction agencies, within the northeastern United States, a no-cost training center. This training center provides all necessary facilities, instruction, and support to enhance the capabilities to reduce and remove illegal drugs from our streets and educate our communities in the most up-to-date prevention techniques.

Regional Training Site - Maintenance: Provides Career Management Field 63MOS qualification, NCOES and ASI - H8 (Recovery) training or other maintenance training or New Equipment Training as directed during peacetime, enabling the U.S. Army to mobilize and deploy USAR components, National Guard and active Army maintenance soldiers capable of supporting current and force modernization systems.

Regional Training Site - Medical: Provides training, training support and validation of mission essential tasks performed by military medical elements. Priority is to Army National Guard medical companies, evacuation assets and combat lifesavers, in the conduct of humanitarian and wartime. Its mission also includes conducting mobile training team assistance and/or assessment visits to units scheduled to train at Medical Battalion Training Site (MBTS).

Lightning Force Academy: The only schoolhouse of this type in the military dedicated to training engineering and installation war fighters who deploy and perform the communications networks installations that aid in the successful total force operation in any theater of operation. Courses taught at the LFA includes; Electronics, Cable/Antenna Standard Installation Practices, Combat Tactics, Fiber Optics, Local Area Network, Team Chief Academy, Project Engineering, Computer Assisted Drafting & Design, Quality Assurance, Team Chief Refresher and Confined Space Entry.

Regional Equipment Operators Training Site: This one-of-a-kind schoolhouse provides proficiency training and enhanced war skills training certification for all civil engineer construction trades. The school places emphasis on bare-base-bed down operations, but also provides training for air base operability mission requirements. REOTS trains equipment operators on four main pieces of airfield damage repair construction equipment; the grader, bulldozer, excavator, and 4CY front-end loader.

Air-To-Ground Bomb Range: Provides an environment for military organizations to conduct live tactical training that includes air-to-ground weapons delivery and tactics, Close Air Support, Joint Attack, and Aerial Re-supply training. Services provided: Day and night bomb and strafe scoring, Battlefield Maneuvering Tactics, Electronic Threat Emission, Surface to Air Missile Identification, Forward Area Controller, Close Air Support, Laser Designation, Rocket Marking and Airdrop Training and Recovery. They also conduct Coordinated Fire, Joint Air Tactics (JAT), and Combat Search And Rescue (CSAR) Training during daylight operations.

U.S. Army Health Clinic: Provides outpatient health care to Fort Indiantown Gap's active duty personnel and their families and Occupational Health Surveillance to the civilian workforce.

Equipment Concentration Site 24: Receives, stores, and issues U.S. Army Reserve equipment and performs operator and organizational maintenance for all equipment assigned to the base USAR or ROTC units.

U.S. Army and Air Force Exchange System: Provides merchandise, services and military apparel to authorized patrons at uniformly low prices and generate reasonable earnings in support of moral, welfare and recreation activities.

Pennsylvania State Police, Physical Fitness Center: In charge of the physical fitness testing for the entire Pennsylvania State Police force, from entry-level to senior officers, by using existing sports facilities at Fort Indiantown Gap.

Training Aid Support Center: Responsible for providing a wide assortment of training materials from creation to final product in support of various schools located at Fort Indiantown Gap.

365th Engineer Battalion: Provides training for heavy equipment operators for horizontal construction. The battalion could deploy overseas if required.

Defense Security Service: Handles background, personnel security investigations for the military (Guard and Reserve), civilians and industrial positions at military bases. The location and cost savings are main reasons for establishing an office at Fort Indiantown Gap.

Direct/General Support Maintenance (DS/GS): Provides DS/GS maintenance support to the 99th Reserve Readiness Center (RRC) and the active Army 15th Training Support Battalion, New Cumberland, the Marine Corps Reserve in Pennsylvania and various other active military organizations, along with mobilization and demobilization missions as assigned.

Pennsylvania National Guard Military Museum: Preserves and honors the history of all units of the Pennsylvania Army and Air National Guard from the Civil War to the present with special emphasis on the 20th century, interpreting for citizens, veterans and young people the story of "The Guard" and Fort Indiantown Gap.

Civil Air Patrol, Pennsylvania Wing: The three primary missions of the CAP are cadet programs, emergency services, and aerospace education to more than 61,000 cadet and senior members nationwide.

AMVETS: Provides free counseling and claims assistance for honorably discharged veterans and dependents. The organization also advocates initiatives to secure earned benefits and

services for veterans and community services that help families, neighbors and the nation at large.

Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (Eastern School): The open areas of Fort Indiantown Gap provide a safe environment to train PennDOT truck and heavy equipment operators to safely operate and prepare individuals for required certification.

Major General James R. Joseph assumed duties as acting adjutant general in Pennsylvania on January 20, 2015 and was unanimously confirmed by the Senate as the 52nd adjutant general and commander of the Pennsylvania National Guard on May 11, 2015. In this cabinet-level position with the Pennsylvania Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, headquartered at Fort Indiantown Gap, General Joseph is responsible for command, control and supervision of National Guard units – Army and Air – allocated to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, six state-owned veterans' homes and programs for Pennsylvania's one million veterans.

General Joseph began his military career as an enlisted soldier in 1971. The U. S. Army War College is the Army's senior command at Carlisle Barracks. The mission of the U.S. Army War College is to educate and develop leaders for service at the strategic level while advancing knowledge in the global application of landpower.

The Army War College pursues its mission by focusing all assets and capabilities toward becoming an internationally recognized graduate level educational community that produces ***strategic leaders and ideas invaluable to the Army, the Joint Force, and the Nation.***

The Army War College executes its mission through its School, Centers and Institutes:

1. **The USAWC School of Strategic Landpower** develops and executes the Army War College signature courses: the senior service level course that is accredited by DoD for Joint Professional Military Education and by Middle States Commission for the Master's of Strategic Studies. The School's educational programs and expert faculty, both resident and distance, develop strategic leaders by providing a strong foundation of wisdom, grounded in master of the profession of arms, and by serving as a crucible for educating future leaders in the analysis, evaluation and refinement of professional expertise in war, strategy, operations, national security, resource management, and responsible command. Student and faculty research routinely provides relevant scholarship and advances professional expertise in landpower and other aspects of national security.

In academic 2015, 2276 students were enrolled in 16 courses of the Army War College.

2. **The Center for Strategic Leadership** of the Army War College supports the missions of the Army War College, the Army, the Joint Force, and national/ international partners by –
 - Educating strategists, strategic advisors, and operational and strategic leaders
 - Supporting senior Army and Joint Force leaders and staffs with expert knowledge and ideas
 - Conducting and supporting Landpower-focused strategic exercises and wargames.
3. **Strategic Studies Institute** and **the USAWC Press** conducts strategic-level study across the realm of national security and military strategy disciplines with an emphasis on geostrategic analysis. The institute provides expertise and analysis to help inform senior leader decision making and defense policy formulation. For more than 100 years, the Army War College has shared important research and critical thinking through publication. The USAWC Press and its research arm, SSI, uses history and current political, economic and military trends to develop strategic recommendations to inform senior defense policy makers, military and defense professionals, academic and students, and the public.
4. **The US Army Peacekeeping and Stability Operations Institute of the Army War College** promotes the collaborative development of Peace and Stability capabilities across the U.S. government and the international community in order to enable the success of future Peace and Stability operations. PKSOI was designated by the Army in 2013 to be the Lead Agent for Joint Proponency in Peace and Stability Operations. Recently, PKSOI was named the Army Proponent for Humanitarian Assistance Operations. The PKSOI team of US and international military officers and State Dept/ USAID apply experience and expertise to international and intergovernmental relationships with the Office of Secretary

of Defense for Policy, Department of State, international organizations, academic, and foreign partners.

5. As part of the US Army War College, **the US Army Heritage and Education Center** (USAHEC) makes available contemporary and historical materials related to strategic leadership, the global application of Landpower, and U.S. Army heritage to inform research, educate an international audience, and honor Soldiers past and present. The Army's only integrated and Smithsonian-affiliated organization, USAHEC offers world-class library support and analysis, the Army's Archive, classified storage and declassification, outdoor and indoor public exhibits, conservation laboratories and operations, long-term artifact storage, oral history development, on-demand digitization and a visitors' event center – all directly supporting the mission of the U.S. Army War College and the U.S. Army's History Program.

The USAHEC campus is a public-government-private development project. Ridgway Hall, the archives, is an Army-funded facility; the Visitor and Education Center (VEC) was made possible by investment by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and private donations managed by the Army Heritage Center Foundation. The next expansion of the VEC will be marked by a groundbreaking ceremony with the Pa. Lieutenant Governor on Nov.23, 2015. Manpower, maintenance and operations are US Army-funded.

The U.S. Army Garrison is the only active Army installation in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, providing extensive services and support to the active military members and families, National Guard, Reserve, and military retiree communities. The Garrison team provides critical security, safety, services and infrastructure to support the Army mission and to enable the development and education of the nation's strategic leaders while supporting the well-being of the regional military community. Carlisle Barracks mission offers retirement services to military retirees throughout the Commonwealth. It offers counseling for jobs, financial stability, substance abuse, and additional services to military, family and employees. It provides sports and recreation to the full military community of active and reserve component Soldiers, retirees, families, and youth.

The garrison has finalized the most extensive construction period since the 1950s: total replacement (or renovation for historic homes) of all military family homes.

The Sergeant Andrew McConnell Youth Center for school-age children opened in 2014, reflecting the Army's commitment to military families.

Dunham U.S. Army Health Clinic, and the **Army Wellness Center** fulfills the mission to promote health and build resilience for the military communities at Carlisle Barracks and, as well, provides oversight to three outlying clinics, at Defense Distribution Center-Susquehanna at New Cumberland, Fort Indiantown Gap, and Letterkenny Army Depot. Dunham offers primary health care to military beneficiaries and occupation healthcare to civilian employees at the Fillmore Health Clinic, New Cumberland Army Depot. Its clinic at Letterkenny Army Depot gives occupational health care to the civilian workforce. The Fort Indiantown Gap clinic annex offers acute care and sick call to active duty Soldiers, to military beneficiaries at thru Dunham's outlying clinics at Fort Indiantown Gap, Letterkenny Army Depot, New Cumberland, which offer occupational health, industrial hygiene and sick call for Soldiers at FTIG.

The scope of services offered by the main Dunham Army Health Clinic at Carlisle Barracks for beneficiaries throughout Pennsylvania includes -- allergy/immunizations clinic, behavioral

health, laboratory, optometry, pediatrics, pharmacy, radiology, and the Exceptional Family Member Program, occupational & environmental health and industrial hygiene. In 2012, the Army's Public Health Command opened the **Army Wellness Center** at Carlisle Barracks to offer health assessments, wellness education, physical fitness guidance, health nutrition education, stress management strategies, and tobacco education for all military and civilian employees, retirees, and military families.

Carlisle Barracks Dental Clinic provides dental treatment to ensure the oral health and readiness of the active duty joint force that live and work within a 60-mile radius of Carlisle Barracks: responsible for dental care of more than 2,100 active duty beneficiaries.

Carlisle Barracks Veterinary Treatment Facility provides animal care services associated with preventing, diagnosing and controlling infectious diseases, for active and retired military and their families.

Carlisle Barracks Criminal Investigation Division Office supports regional investigations for the Army.

Defense Commissary Agency delivers a premier Commissary benefit to the armed services community that encourages an exciting shopping experience; satisfies customer demand for quality grocery and household products; delivers exceptional savings while enhancing quality of life, fostering recruitment, retention and readiness and supports warfighters' peace of mind, knowing their families have secure and affordable access to American products.

Major General William E. Rapp graduated from the United States Military Academy (USMA) in 1984 and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Corps of Engineers. His civilian education includes a Bachelor of Science degree from USMA, a Masters of Arts in Political Science and a PhD in International Relations from Stanford University. His military education includes the Engineer Officer Basic Course, Infantry Officer Advanced Course, US Army Command and General Staff College, the Army War College where he earned a Masters of Arts in National Security Policy, and the Joint Forces Staff College. He was the distinguished honor graduate of his Infantry Officer Advance Course, Ranger School class, Jumpmaster class, and the Strategist Program at CGSC. Major General Rapp is a licensed Professional Engineer in the state of Virginia.

He served as the chief of G3 operations for the first year, during which he deployed to Los Angeles with elements of the division to quell a massive civil disturbance. In the second year, he was the executive officer of 2nd Battalion, 27th Infantry Regiment.

In 1993, Dr. Betros was assigned to the G3 section of Forces Command headquarters at Fort McPherson, GA. During that time, he deployed for several months to Mogadishu as a joint planner for JTF-Somalia. He next reported to Fort Jackson, SC, to command 1st Battalion, 34th Infantry Regiment, a basic training unit. Upon completing his command tour, he was selected as the senior aide to the Secretary of the Army, Honorable Louis Caldera, in 1998. He then began studies at the National War College, where he finished as a distinguished graduate; additionally, he won the Association of the United States Army writing award for a paper on civil-military relations that was subsequently published in *Armed Forces & Society*.

In 2000, Dr. Betros returned to West Point as an Academy Professor in the Department of History. He served for two years in the Military History Division before being selected as a Professor USMA and deputy head of the Department. He became the head in 2005.

As the Head of the Department of History, Dr. Betros implemented major curricular reforms in the fourth-class history program that advanced interdisciplinary learning and the cultural education of cadets. Additionally, he established two centers of excellence—the Center for Oral History and the Center for Holocaust and Genocide Studies. He was the co-executive editor of the Center for Oral History's first full-length documentary film, *Into Harm's Way*. As a scholar, he contributed to the historical literature on West Point by publishing two important books, *West Point: Two Centuries and Beyond* and *Carved from Granite: West Point since 1902*.

Dr. Betros served with distinction on Academy governance and advisory boards and special-purpose committees. He led the two-year effort to secure the NCAA's certification of West Point's intercollegiate athletics program in 2009. Additionally, he chaired the Museum, Memorialization, and Historical Committee for one year and the Curriculum Committee for two years; in the latter position, he was the principal author of an influential study on advancing the cultural education of cadets. He was a member of the Academic Board, Policy Board, and General Committee.

Dr. Betros completed his 35-year Army career on 1 October 2012, at which time he advanced to the rank of Brigadier General (Retired). He assumed duties as the Provost, United States Army War College, on July 23, 2012.
